
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WHY: To be better stewards of our finances

Convention 2012

Will you be attending the LWML Rocky Mountain District convention June 22-24 in El Paso, TX?

Come celebrate the 70th anniversary of the LWML with your sisters in Christ in the RMD. You'll see details in other sections of this newsletter highlighting the great worship services, Bible studies, and enrichment sessions planned for the convention. Don't miss this opportunity for "Living the Grande Life". There is something of interest for everyone – no matter your age, experience, or service background.

Certain questions come up at each convention. I'm devoting my article this month to answer a few of them:

1. Why is there a registration fee? Registration fees cover the expenses of the convention like room and table charges, audio visual equipment rental, 22% service charges, and speaker honorariums.

2. Why should I stay at the convention hotel rather than another location? Aside from the convenience of staying right where our convention is held, our contract with the Marriott is based on reserving 100 rooms for lodging. Your room reservation helps us meet our contract and means less meeting room rental expense.

3. Why should I buy a meal package? We work hard to negotiate reasonable meals with the convention hotel. Similar to the lodging rooms, we contracted to purchase a certain amount of food and beverage items.

4. Why is there business during our time together? This is the only time during the 2012-2014 biennium the Lutheran Women's Missionary League of the Rocky Mountain District will meet to conduct business. We will vote on a new Mission Goal, elect new officers, and select new grant recipients.

5. Why should I REALLY plan to go to this convention?

- Grow spiritually during Bible studies and worship times
- Hear stories of hope, healing, and faith
- Experience uplifting music
- Laugh with other women who share your faith
- Spend time with the One who wants you "Living the Grande Life"

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Enrichment Session Speakers

Mary Marten - LWML and the 21st Century

Mary considers herself a child of God and is blessed to have been raised in the LCMS. She attended Lutheran schools, taught for many years, and served in LWML on the society, zone and district levels - most recently as Rocky Mountain District President from 2002 – 2006 and MMV until last October.

LWML and the 21st Century - Does your LWML fit into the society of the 21st century? Do we need to change ("Oh, MY!") or can we still make an impact? This session will be a brainstorming one in which we look at our societies to see what we do that is already effective and how we can become, with God's guidance, more effective to reach today's woman.

Rev. Dr. Karl Heimer de la Cotera - Hispanic Outreach Ministry

Dr. Heimer is currently serving as Pastor/Director of San Pablo Lutheran Church in El Paso, Texas and is also volunteer CEO at Ysleta Lutheran Mission Human Care, a faith-based non-profit organization that provides relief and human care services while planting and nurturing missions on the US/ Mexico border (El Paso/Juarez Region). YLMHC is adamant about sharing its belief in "Feeding the Hungry, Nurturing Mission and Educating Leaders". A Recognized Service Organization of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, YLMHC provides human needs to thousands every year.

Hispanic Outreach Ministry – Hear from Dr. Heimer about Hispanic Outreach. His experience with YLMHC includes a hot meal program; a food pantry; spiritual needs for inmates ; food, clothing and spiritual guidance to nine different missions in Juarez; Adelante Music Ministry classes that provide music lessons at low, affordable rates; and Mariachi San Pablo, part of the Adelante Music Ministry that has been an instrument to break through into the community and provides outreach to churches all over the United States.


Hotel Reservations

Call the Marriott at 1-915-779-3300 <u>say that you are part of the RMD LWML</u> group. One person can reserve a room and everyone in the room can still pay with their own credit card when they check in.

• What happens after selecting delegates?

Select your delegates and their alternates and register them at least **<u>30 days prior to the convention</u>**.
