

Courageous to Serve

Wow, the convention is over and we come off the mountain top and return to our everyday life “courageous to serve.” What does this mean? But courageously, we can say, “Here I am, Lord, send me.” There are many opportunities to serve our Lord in our church, society, zone, district, and even nationally. Right now in our district we need: an Archivist/Historian, Convention Coordinator “Shadow,” District Committee Chairmen, Committee members. An important thought to remember is that no matter what the opportunity to serve, you are not alone, God will “fit” you for His

Pray that They May Declare it Boldly

How wonderful it was to gather this past June in Colorado Springs for the 2016 LWML RMD convention. It was a blessing to gather in worship and hear God's Word. It was a joy to be led in Bible study and reflect on God, our refuge and fortress. It was great to have a time of fellowship with one another, seeing familiar faces, and meeting new sisters in Christ. And, of course, it was great to focus on our Lord's mission.

One of the most important items of business at the convention was to select the mission grants that the LWML RMD will support with their mites throughout the 2016-2018 biennium. Some of the missions on the list may be ones with which you are very familiar. Others may be less familiar and hopefully you can take time to learn more about the things they are doing for the spread of the Gospel. All of them are wonderful opportunities to reach out with the love of Christ Jesus our Lord.

In Paul's letter to the Ephesians, Paul exhorts them to put on the whole armor of God so that we may be able to stand against the schemes of the Devil. He writes:

For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers over this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places. Therefore take up the whole armor of God, that you may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand firm. Stand therefore, having fastened on the belt of truth, and having put on the breastplate of righteousness, and, as shoes for your feet, having put on the readiness given by the gospel of peace. In all circumstances take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming darts of the evil one; and take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God, praying at all times in the Spirit, with all prayer and

supplication. To that end keep alert with all perseverance, making supplication for all the saints, and also for me, that words may be given to me in opening my mouth boldly to proclaim the mystery of the gospel, for which I am an ambassador in chains, that I may declare it boldly, as I ought to speak (Ephesians 6:12-20).

This is a fantastic text, one that you are likely familiar with and have studied a time or two. In it we are reminded of the spiritual warfare that Satan continues to wage against God's church, but we are told of the armor that God Himself fits us with that we may stand.

What I would like to draw your attention to is Paul's exhortation to make "supplication for all the saints." In other words, pray! He even asks them to pray for him. Paul wants those prayers. He knows he needs those prayers, for the devil is hard at work to trying to thwart the spread of the Gospel.

I'm sure each of the recipients of our mission grants would request the same thing from you. The devil is hard at work to frustrate the work of God in this world. He strives to lead us into despair. He attempts to distract us from the main message of the Cross. He wants to sow seeds of confusion, and hatred, and doubt. But the Lord our God has won the victory through Christ. He has fitted us with his armor that we may be shielded from the attacks of the evil one. He has clothed us in His righteousness, and He has spoken to us the truth about our forgiveness and life in Christ.

As you give your mites, pray for each of these missions. Pray that the Lord would use our gifts to His glory. Pray that those involved with each mission would be strengthened for service. Pray that they would proclaim the Gospel boldly.

At the recent LWML RMD convention, our convention delegates voted to increase the Mission part of our Mite goal to \$80,700 for our 2016-2018 Biennium. Remembering that the Trinity is our “Fortress and Refuge” we look for mites to support mission grants once again. Those same delegates, with some direction from you and their society members, chose thirteen mission grants to support in the next two years. Several are ministries that are successful but with on-going needs, others are new with a one time or on-going need.

These ministries and our LWML RMD covet your prayers and your financial support in the coming months. We encourage societies to think of interesting ways to keep the Mites coming and in the spirit of our military theme at the June convention, “enlisting” women and men, young and old, to be involved.

Music to God's Ears

I recently read an article by Elmer L. Towns who wrote, "When you attend a symphony, you first hear the orchestra tuning up. This can be disconcerting, because it's not melodic- it sounds like a lot of discordant screeching because every instrument is doing its own thing. When the conductor raises his baton, however, the instruments come together in harmony."



At my Zone's spring workshop, our zone pastoral counselor, Pastor Schmidt, spoke about "the call", a day in which seminary students find out their first congregation where they will be the pastor and that all the LCMS churches will be praying for those new pastors. We sang, "God of the Prophets, Bless the Prophet's Sons" as part of his presentation. I couldn't help but wonder who that songwriter was and how was he so inspired by the Holy Spirit to write such beautiful poetry? So I did a little digging and googled the author. His name is Denis Wortman, born in 1835. He pastored a church in Brooklyn, N.Y.

I reread each verse to see if he used scripture and there in the very first line he talked about Elijah's mantle over Elisha. That is scripture! I looked it up in 1 Kings where his coat was thrown over Elisha the first time and continued to read in 2 Kings where Elisha asked to inherit a double portion of Elijah's spirit. Maybe it was a combination of both scriptures?

The continuing verses were, "their hearts aflame, and their eyes awake to every human need." Making pastors strong intercessors and anointing them with the spirit of God's son. Also, making them apostles, heralds of Your cross and to let them go and tell the world of grace.

We sang this poetic song in harmony on their special day and after all their studying and love for God they are now new pastors. Your pastor had that happen too! Your pastor has his eyes awake to every human need, and is a herald of the cross!

Scripture tells us in Philippians 2:2 being like-minded and being in one spirit and purpose is what we are supposed to be like. Harmony reminds me also of being in one accord, praying the same thing to God the Father (Acts 4:24a).

The author of our LWML song is Reverend Elmer Wollaston. His first service was held on October 11, 1931 which is probably why we celebrate LWML in October!

Young Women Reps 2016 LWML RMD Convention

It was 9 PM on a Saturday evening and I found myself in a hotel conference room among eleven women. We had just spent the day together attending meetings, worshiping, singing praise songs and packing care packages for active duty military members. I was exhausted. Although both my physical and mental energy seemed to have faded, I managed to focus on our group devotion. Kelsey, one of the YWR committee members, placed a small picture in front of us. The picture depicted a man standing before a tall white and blue wave. The man looked tiny and insignificant in the presence of the massive wave. Although the picture would be forever frozen in time, I imagined the actual outcome of this event. I was convinced that the wave must have swallowed the man. The man may have survived, but the wave was surely too big, too powerful, too strong to overcome. Kelsey's message was simple: even in the midst of what seems to be life's most inescapable challenges, God ensures that we prevail.

Ironically, my exhaustion seemed to temporarily lift as I considered this message. It was similar to many messages I had previously heard in countless church services and Sunday School classes. Yet I had to ashamedly admit to myself that I struggled to live this message. Although I believe this message to be true, I continually struggle to trust in God. There are many instances in life that seem impossible to overcome. Rather than trust in God, we often find ourselves scared, worrying and attempting to "control" situations that are simply beyond our control.

This devotion caused me to reflect on the time I had spent with these women. As YWRs (Young Women Representatives) we came together for the LWML Rocky Mountain District Convention in Colorado Springs, CO. Although each from different states, backgrounds and experiences, we gathered together for one common purpose: to serve the Lord and others. Our time together began on Friday as we shared lunch getting to know each other through conversation and fellowship. Our daily schedules were soon filled with meetings and activities. Despite only knowing each other for a few hours, we seamlessly worked together, as a team, to assist in the servant projects, worship services and daily devotions.

In the midst of our time together as YWRs, we were surrounded by a caring and dedicated community of LWML members. During our daily meetings, I was amazed to witness hundreds of Lutheran women selflessly donating to a variety of missions. I learned that LWML has raised millions of dollars to help people in need throughout the world. I felt privileged and honored to be part of a group that was changing the world. Not only were these women giving of their money and time, they were giving of themselves. Throughout the weekend I had several conversations with women who spoke of their experiences in LWML and their common passion: to bring the love of Christ to others.

To end the YWR evening devotion, Kelsey asked the YWRs to share our own life experiences that seemed impossible to overcome. Our time together was concluded with stories of tears, hardship, doubt, pain and ultimately of hope. We were different women, with different experiences, but we had overcome. We had survived life's obstacles with God's help and we will overcome death through Christ's sacrifice. Headed to my hotel room that night I was filled with peace and awe. Not only had God placed me in the midst of some incredible young women, He had also given me the opportunity to serve with hundreds of women who continually overcome life's challenges in order to serve God and others. The theme of the LWML Rocky Mountain District Convention, "God: Our Fortress and Refuge," suddenly seemed even more fitting: *"I will say of the Lord, 'He is my refuge and my fortress, my God, in whom I trust'"* (Psalm 91:2).


District YWR and H2H Sister Application for 2017
