Banner Design and Young Woman Representatives Revealed at BOD



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Words with Substance

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. 1 Corinthians 1:3

Birthdays. Occasions. Holidays and anniversaries. "Congratulations!" "Get well soon!" "Happy Bastille Day!" Well, maybe not that last one. But every so often family, close friends, and coworkers send thoughtful cards. Greeting Card companies have made bazillions manufacturing cards for us so that we might tell someone that we are thinking of them. We pick out a card and sign our name and maybe, we will include a short handwritten note to make the card more personal. We have been thinking of that person long before buying that card and we will be thinking of them long after we have sent it.

Some people may read 1 Corinthians 1:3, "Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ" and conclude that is a type of common, generic greeting like, "Happy Birthday" on a card. True, Paul did use those same words as a greeting in many of his other letters. Those words, though, mean much, much more than "Hi", because Paul wishes grace and peace to people from God our Father and the Lord Jesus! It is His grace that extends through eternity past, present, and future because God and His grace are without beginning or end. That grace embraces you now as you begin your Lenten meditation this month. That grace encircles you as you face whatever is going on in your life, all because in His amazing grace the Son of God became incarnate as a human being just like you, walked in your shoes, and will never forget what it is like for you.

People forget to appreciate that grace when they consider the Bible just a bunch of words put together a long time ago that don't have much to say to someone living today or in our circumstance. The Bible doesn't have much to say when I am struggling. "If only I could talk face-to-face with God instead." Those people think the Bible will have no more effect on our lives than receiving a greeting card with a factory printed message that the person who signed it didn't even write. Just like last year's card, some would throw away the promises that God has made to them in His Word, as if they were just wishful thinking when they don't seem to change their lives. (Like it's one thing to receive a "Get well" card, and it is another thing to actually get well!)

Tidings readers, "grace and peace" are more than just words. They are statements about God Himself. "Grace and peace" are statements about God's eternal unchanging heart toward you. Grace – He wants to be beyond generous to you. Peace – He feels no anger toward you. Jesus proved those words with His unhesitating life of service and His unlimited self-sacrifice on the cross for the sins of the world. For your sins and my sins.

"Grace and peace" sets you apart from the world. "Grace and peace" give you something unique and blessed that you can count on. "Grace and peace" give you....... God's own heart.

Financial Assistance for Concordia Theological **Seminary Food Co-op**

The Food and Clothing Co-op on the campus of Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, Indiana plays a key role in helping students feed and clothe their families during their seminary years. Nearly 60 percent of the students are married, second career with families. Access to the seminary's Food and Clothing Co-op helps reduce their financial burden. The Food Co-op supplies approximately 80 to 85 percent of all food and household needs each month at no cost to the student. It operates as an actual cooperative with each family volunteering at the Co-op, earning points to be redeemed on shopping day. The Co-op is supported by donations from individuals, churches and other organizations. We adopted an \$8000 grant to support this ministry at our 2018 convention.

The Co-op spends about \$7000 a month on perishable items, household and paper products. The Co-op is current feeding 427 people (283 seminary students and spouses, 144 children). Since July 1, 2018 the Co-op has been able to purchase the following items:

- \$3,127.58 at the grocery store
- \$15,344.68 in fresh produce
- \$6,474.41 in fresh dairy
- \$2,383.61 in paper products (diapers, baby wipes, laundry and dishwasher detergent, paper towels and toilet paper)
- \$1,809.13 from the local food bank

Plus they received 15 hogs and 2 steers to provide meat for the students.

The Waters of Our Lives

RIVER WATER. Colorado River. Platte River, Arkansas River. During our 17 years in Colorado, U.S., these three rivers provided irrigation water, fishing, entertainment and at times devastation. Interstate 70 and the Colorado River run side by side in a very narrow gorge near Glenwood Springs, Colorado. Most of the time, both co-exist peacefully. However, with an excessive amount of rain, the power of the water/river has overcome and flooded the lower level of the two-story interstate highway causing its closure. The rivers serve as examples of power, calmness and sustenance. Even more importantly, the rivers are examples of our need for water, living water.

GRANDPARENTS' FARM POND. The Colorado rivers are recent memories. but my childhood pond in Eldridge, Missouri, is a lasting memory. The pond was needed for the farm animals, the garden and for fishing. To keep the pond filled with water, we were dependent on the goodness of God to send the rain. I still remember how we watched the hoof prints of the cows and horses on the edges of the pond's banks to determine how to prioritize the water's use. This pond was the centre of our earthly lives. Although my grandparents, who reared me, have been deceased for years and the farm sold, I still see the hoof prints in the pond's mud.

DEEP WATER. The deer pants for water in the first half of Psalm 42:1; the second half of the verse says, "so my soul pants for you, O God." God provides the water the deer need. Can you see the deer take a drink, look up, gaze about and drink again? Do we pant for God and drink of His water?

LIVING WATER FOR THE SAMARITAN WOMAN. The need for living water is clearly expressed in John 4 when Jesus talks with the Samaritan woman. She

had gone to the well to draw water to drink. Jesus asks her for a drink. Both the woman and Jesus would benefit from the drink of water. To her surprise as a Samaritan, Jesus, a Jew, offers her a drink of water, living water. He even explains to her that by drinking the living water she will never thirst again. In verse 13, Jesus says the water will "well up to eternal life."

LIVING WATER FOR YOU AND ME.

Just as the Samaritan woman needed earthly water and living water, so do we need earthly water, but especially the living water of Jesus. In our baptism, we received living water in accordance with the words of Matthew 28:19. In Luther's Small Catechism with Explanation (CPH), it says, "As Christians, we are God's baptized people! We are His adopted children, together with all believers and we live and die in the confidence that He has redeemed us and we are His."

Consider studying Isaiah 55 which is a special invitation from God to the thirsty.

LIVING WATER SHARED. How blessed we are to be given opportunities to share the living water of Christ with others. I offer a few simple suggestions for your consideration:

- 1. Use or include a Christian message or Bible verse with greeting cards
- 2. Include a Christian thought with a meal or food provided to help others.
- 3. Tell your own or others' children and grandchildren that Jesus loves them; start at birth and continue as they grow older.
- 4. Greet people with a smile and a kind word.
- 5. If you wear a cross and receive a compliment, be ready with a thank you and a brief statement about the meaning/importance of the cross for you and/or others.

Mighty Mites coming!


