T'm sure that many of you have heard the old joke, "How many Lutherans does it take to change a lightbulb? None. They don't like change." We certainly do have a reputation for being a people opposed to change. This is in large part due to the traditional nature of our worship and faith. This is not a bad thing. It is not something that we should try to hide or be ashamed of. Tradition has an important role in our lives as Christians. Nonetheless, there are many who seek to be proponents of change. This is not automatically a bad thing either.

There are times when change is not a terrible thing. As we get older, we need to adjust how we move and do things so that we can still accomplish our needed tasks and be safe. It is necessary to adjust and change in the life of a congregation as well. We do renovation projects and give parts of the building a face lift. People get new positions of leadership. Congregation members move away while new people join. Young people grow up, get confirmed, and move away. Pastors come and go. It was only a short time ago that the LCMS adopted a new hymnal.

If we are honest, there is no shortage of change that happens in our lives. The really frightening nature of change is not the change itself, it is the nature of the unknown associated with the change. We don't know what is going to happen. If we take a step, if we move or change, how is it going to turn out? This is what brings fear for us. This is what makes change so worrisome.

As we ponder these things, I am reminded of this passage from the book of Hebrews, Jesus Christ is the

same yesterday and today and forever. Hebrews 13:8 (ESV) We have a God who does not change. This means that even in the face of all the changes that we see in this life, our God remains with us and he remains unchanging.

He continues to speak to us with the same Word that he has used for thousands of years. Our sins are washed away in the waters of Baptism just as they have for every generation of Christians before us and after us. We receive the same body and blood of Christ that every other Christian has faithfully received. These are the things of our God and they are the ways in which he comes and serves us. He blesses us with this unchanging nature so that we never have to continue to redefine ourselves or our faith. We never need fear that we have to find some new way to connect to God because he is the one who in his unchanging love comes to

All of this He does out of His divine grace and mercy that we have received in Jesus Christ our Lord. We have nothing to fear in this life because if God is for us, who can be against us? That includes also the changes that happen in life. As long as we remain faithful to who we are, what we have been given, we can make changes to the other things and that can be seen as good rather than troubling.

When we take the time to examine what is absolutely necessary and what things are not central to our identity, we can find the space to try new things. We can see such changes as opportunities to bring in new people and share with them the things that matter to us, even if we are doing it in a slightly different way now.

University Lutheran Chapel

Currently, University Lutheran Chapel (ULC), located on the campus of the University of Colorado in Boulder, has a group of about 20 students that gather for Divine Service, Bible Studies, theology game nights, and other fellowship activities. Pastor Hayes is their full-time campus pastor to shepherd them as they face the many faith challenges of college life on a secular campus.

A few times a year at university events, like the Involvement Fair, the ULC students host a table to reach out to new students. This past winter, eight students and Pastor Hayes attended the LCMS National Campus Ministry conference in Fort Wayne, Ind. The topic was "Witness." In the spring, ULC hosted a similar event including students from Colorado

State University and Wyoming, focusing on ways to talk to people when they express their reasons for not going to church.



During the last school year students completed a fundraiser to repair the pipe organ that has broken for six years. The organ was rededicated on Sunday, July 21, 2019. Amy Schultz, LWML RMD VP Gospel

At the National LWML Convention in June, Mites in Action speaker Jaclyn Rychel spoke of her mission to the Christian Eldercare Home in Haiti (2017–2019 LWML Mission Grant #10). She moved us to tears speaking of these "forgotten" people, who were once beloved mothers and fathers, now forgotten and left to starve on the streets. These people craving human contact are happy for a touch from another person.

The Bible is full of promises from God that He will not forget us. Isaiah 46:4–5 is my favorite: Even to your old age and gray hairs I am he, I am he who will sustain you. I have made you and I will carry you; I will sustain you and I will rescue you.

"With whom will you compare me or count me equal? To whom will you liken me that we may be compared?"

Thank God that we will never be truly alone. At the same time, thanks be to God that there are ministries out there for those that physically have been forgotten. It seems we live in a world that is so self-centered that when things (or people) have passed their usefulness, we get rid of them, and just throw them away. We've seen this in the divorce rate and genocide. Let's pray to God to help us see the usefulness of the people around us, so we don't take them for granted and always cherish them. §
