They also are busy with initial plans for the 2022 Rocky Mountain District Convention in Albuquerque, NM. It takes lots of dedication behind the scenes to plan these events. Fall Rally dates will be announced in our next issue.

Sadly, the LWML RMD was forced to remove the grant proposed by Bethesda Communities. Due to changes in staffing at Bethesda Communities, Colorado, we are no longer able to fund that mission grant for the 2020–2022 biennium. The grant was specifically written to cover travel expenses and resources for the Religious Life staff, which has been eliminated. We encourage continued prayers and support for the Bethesda Auxiliary and Bethesda clients. In February our Rocky Mountain District Board of Directors met via Zoom. Our Events Planning Committee shared information about the 2022 LWML RMD Albuquerque Convention and 2021 RMD Fall Retreat. Plans are well underway for these events. I can't wait to see many of you in person soon.

One of the big topics discussed was the 2021 LWML Lexington Convention. At this time plans are going forward to meet in person in Lexington. The 2021 LWML Lexington Convention will be held June 24-27, 2021, at the Rupp Arena, home of the Kentucky Wildcats. The arena has a seating capacity of 20,500 providing plenty of space to socially distance. President Debbie Larson and the Convention Planning Committee (CPC) have planned and prayed for months to determine how to hold an in-person convention safely during a pandemic. Safety precautions are in place and all state and federal guidelines will be followed. Please continue to pray for President Debbie and the CPC during the next few months. I plan to attend the convention and am hopefully optimistic that we will gather in person.

Registration forms can be completed on-line or mailed. More information and registration forms are in the winter Quarterly. The Early Registration Deadline has been extended through April 14, 2021. Visit the LWML website for up to date information.

The convention theme is "Running the Race...Looking to Jesus." Linda Reiser will be our Keynote Speaker and Heidi Goehmann will be our Bible Study Leader. This will be Heidi's first LWML Convention. Dr. Dina Vendetti will be our song leader. Servants Events will be held on Thursday, June 24, 2021. Many half and full day tours are available pre and post convention. The Saturday evening entertainment is open to all attendees and their guests free of charge.

The Mission Goal and Mission Grant balloting will be done electronically prior to convention. Thirty-four mission grants were selected for the ballot including two Rocky Mountain District grants, Bringing the Inner-City Children to Camp, Lutheran Valley Retreat, Colorado, and Showing God's Love in the International District, Albuquerque, NM. Former Rocky Mountain **District Pastoral Counselor Reverend Gary Piepkorn has been** nominated for Pastoral Counselor. Please keep these ministries and Pastor Piepkorn in your prayers.

All sessions and worship services will be live-streamed. You can even participate in a Virtual Photo Finish Mission Walk. Gather pledges and mission dollars and take pictures of your walk. These photos will be displayed on the screen during the 2021 LWML Lexington Convention if emailed by June 4, 2021.

Please share this information with your group and congregation. I hope to see many of you in Lexington.

Mercy Meals

I mmanuel Lutheran School's kitchen used to be a busy place. Five days a week, delicious meals such as French bread pizza and chili with cinnamon rolls were prepared to feed hungry school children. Sadly, the school closed its doors in 2009. This once bustling kitchen lost its purpose and was destined to be idle and empty. Or was it?

Immanuel members Duane & Marilyn Grasz and Miriam Schinnerer attended a luncheon in early 2018. The speaker, Garry Fuller the director of the Orphan Grain Train (OGT) station in Castle Rock, shared the need for Mercy Meals to be packaged. However, OGT could not find any spaces in Castle Rock that would work to package the meals. The Immanuel members invited Mr. Fuller to come to Colorado Springs to ask if the Immanuel school kitchen could work for packaging the meals. After confirming that the kitchen met the specific requirements of the OGT headquarters in Norfolk, installing the necessary equipment, and

making a trial run of packaging meals, the kitchen at Immanuel once again found purpose in feeding people.

Developed by nutrition scientists, Mercy Meals contain white longgrain rice, a food staple around the world; soy flakes to supply protein; a blend of dried vegetables to provide color and flavor; and chicken flavoring that includes 20 vitamins and minerals. These four dry ingredients are packaged into 3-ply bags which will keep for long periods. All that is required to make a nutritious meal for six people is to add boiling water. Each bag only costs \$0.78! Since Mercy Meals of Colorado Springs began packaging meals in January 2019, 48 volunteers from 5 different churches have made 139,740 meals that have been shipped across the US and around the world.

The Rocky Mountain District LWML is providing a \$5,000 Mission Grant to support Mercy Meals of Colorado Springs.

Over 30 women attended this During this pandemic, everything has been turned upside down. Events have been canceled, sometimes even church was canceled. Some people have used this time to renew their faith, participate in online Bible Studies, and to make new steps in their faith journey. Some have merely drifted away. They couldn't attend, so when restrictions opened up, it wasn't high in their priorities. The sad thing is that as the Convention theme states, we are running a race (Hebrews 12:1-2). The race hasn't stopped because of the pandemic. Jesus is still coming again, and everyone will still be judged, regardless of how they were affected by the pandemic.

Do you recognize someone in your life who is no longer paying attention to the "race"? Let's take a minute to put something into them that will yield good fruit, whether that is support, encouragement, or maybe just a kind word.

In past years the proceeds have gone to LCMS World and Disaster Relief, the church preschool, Navajo Mission, LWML RMD Mites, the Durango Pregnancy Center, and for Syrian refugee work by Lutheran Hour Ministries. This year the entire amount of \$2,792 was donated locally to the Durango Food Bank.

Over 45 pies, desserts, cakes, and "pietificates" were available for purchase. Those who could not attend could order pies ahead of time or participate virtually. There were even kid-sized treats to buy. *Charity never faileth.* (I Corinthians 13:8 KJV).

In December we organized a "Share Some Warmth" Drive-Thru, during which people were invited to donate, without leaving the safety and comfort of their cars, much-needed blankets and socks to God Cares About You. We collected and delivered 69 warm blankets, 269 pairs of socks, and

dozens of gently-used winter coats, hats, mittens, and gloves.

In the fall we sponsored a Dessert Happy Hour Drive-Thru. Tasty, home-made dessert items and root beer floats were offered, and a donation check of \$790 was sent to Pastor Norton's Navajo Mission. Concordia Seminary's Food Bank was the recipient of a donation of \$400 as the result of our Drive-Thru Cookie Sale in the spring.




