Life in Christ

T noticed that the Easter candy went on sale the day after Easter. It was a bit surprising that they waited that long. Those chocolates, which were found hidden in plastic Easter eggs, have all mysteriously disappeared. The weather in the mountains of northern Colorado was absolutely glorious on Easter even if a bit chilly – bringing to mind the beginning of another Spring. But even the weather seems to have already forgotten about Easter and Spring, given the snow that keeps falling. It may seem like Easter has come and gone; a day long anticipated, but that passes by with the bat of an eye.

But that's not so in church! The Easter Season lasts 49 days: from Easter Sunday until Pentecost, which is 50 days after Easter. For seven weeks — which is sometimes known as a *week of weeks* — Christians celebrate Christ's victory over sin, death, and the Devil for us and our salvation. For 40 days after His resurrection, Jesus appeared to many people: first to the women at the tomb (Matthew 28:9) His disciples in the upper room (John 20:19-31); two men traveling on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35); the disciples on the beach (John 21); a group of 500 people (1 Corinthians 15:6); and His disciples again when He ascended into heaven (Matthew 28:18-20).

So far this Season of Easter, we have heard some of these post-Resurrection appearances. We have also heard some of the promises that Jesus made before His crucifixion: that Jesus is our Good Shepherd; that He has come to lay down His life for us; and that because of what He has done for us, we will live forever with Him.

That is what this Season is all about: New Life in Christ. Jesus Christ has taken us, poor miserable sinners that we are, and given us life everlasting. He has freed us from our bondage to sin; rescued us from the power of the devil; and promised us that He will not leave us dead, but will bring us through death to live eternally with Him.


It is for this reason that we'll keep saying it again and again:

Interns Return to Shepherd of the Valley

r he Intern Program is on for this **L** summer! Pastor Tim Norton and his family have continued to serve the Navajo Nation at Shepherd of the Valley Lutheran Church in Navajo, NM throughout the pandemic. The Reservation has had even tighter restrictions than many places in the United States — including very few opportunities to worship in person – and has been heavily hit by the COVID-19 outbreak. But now as things very slowly open back up, Pastor Norton reports that the church will again be served by a summer intern.

The Navajo Nation is the largest Native Nation by both population and geographic size — 25,000 square miles (the size of West Virginia)! The long-term goal of this mission at Shepherd of the Valley is to "train Navajo leaders who can plant churches and demonstrate Christ's love to their own people, in their own communities, across the expansive Navajo Nation." (see www.lutheranindianministries.org/ navajo-reservation-nm) Prior to the pandemic, interns have come each summer to help with VBS, prison devotions, sports camps, and generally assisting the ministry among the community. While this summer may look a little different, the message shared is the same: Jesus, your Savior, loves you.

Please keep the Norton family in your prayers as they continue to share the Good News with their community. We as a district are pleased to have Heidi Norton attend the upcoming convention in Lexington as our Heart to Heart Sister trainer! God has certainly blessed Shepherd of the Valley and we pray that He will continue to do so.



Should we have live music or "canned" music as my Grandfather would have called it. Should it be more contemporary? Should we have a band? Should we, should we, should we?

Here in Grand Junction, Colorado, we have been able to worship in person for some time now. Last year, our twin daughters went through the Rite of Confirmation in a private ceremony. No singing. Private due to limited numbers allowed, so each family had their own service. This year we were able to see several of our youth take their first Communion on Palm Sunday.
